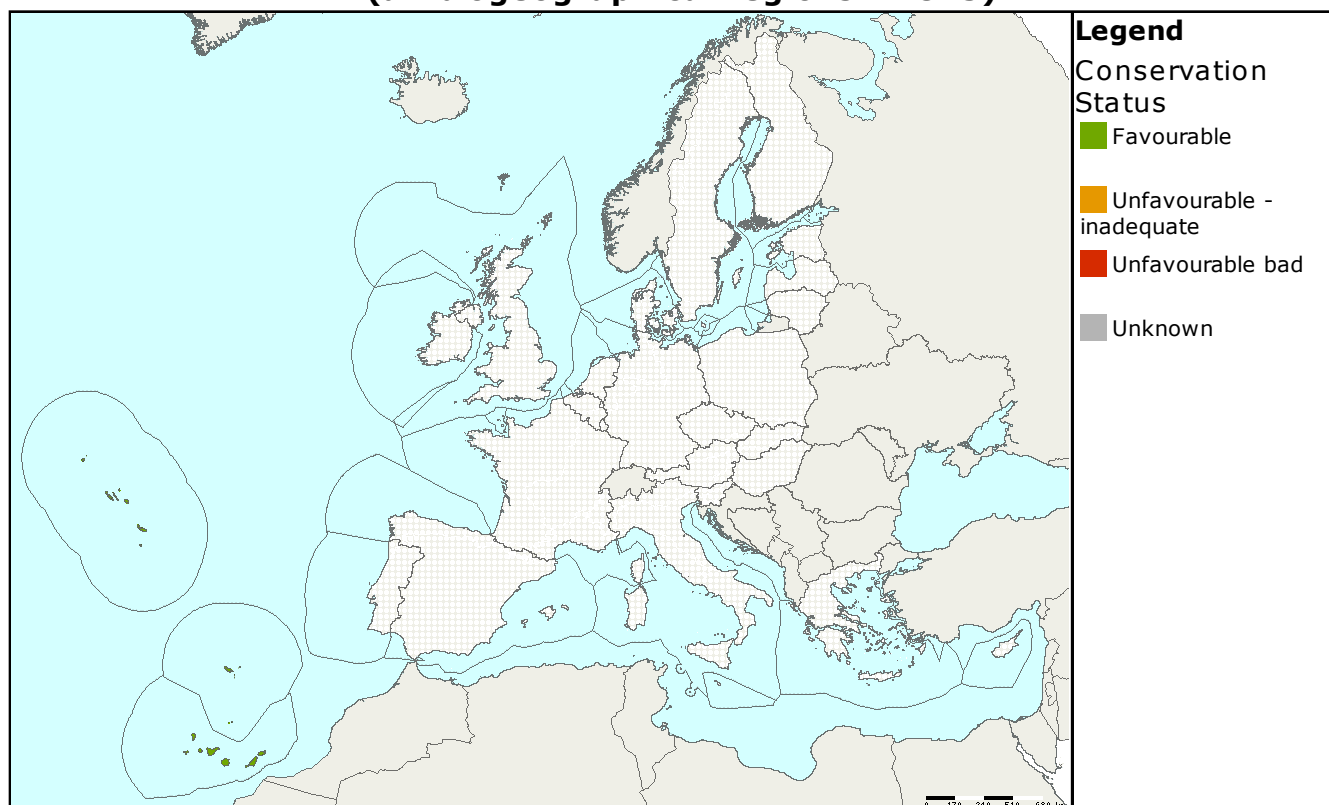

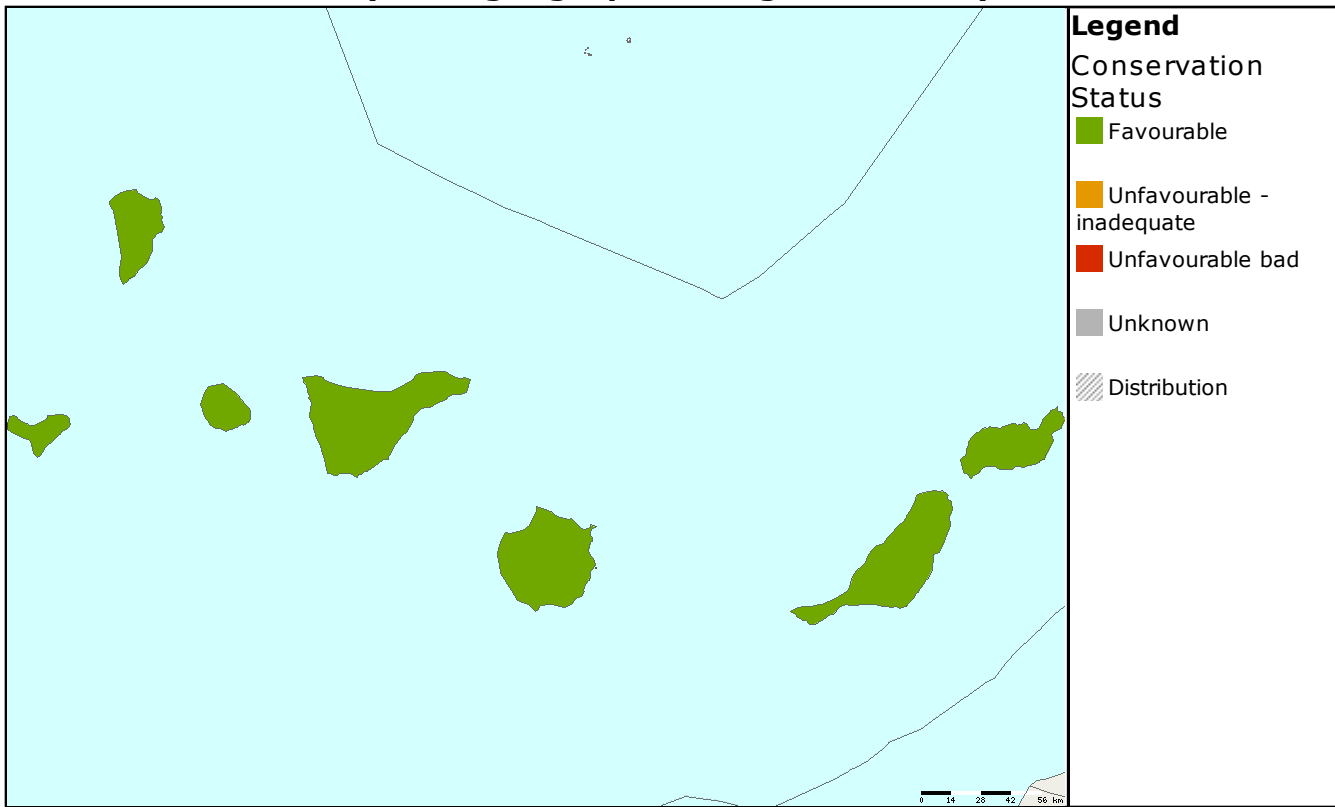

The East Canary Gecko is endemic to Fuerteventura, Lanzarote, Lobos, Graciosa, Montaña Clara, Alegranza and the Roque del Este islands, the Canary Islands, Spain. It can be found in variety of habitats from cliffs and rocky walls to shrub formations or orchards and gardens.

It occurs only in the Macaronesian biogeographical region. The conservations status of this within its range relatively common and abundant species is 'favourable', range and population size are stable and no major threats were recorded. However, the reference range should be higher than actual, which indicates that this parameter should not be evaluated as 'favourable'. The species is assessed as 'least concern' in the 2008 IUCN Red List.
