



The Spanish terrapin is a turtle occurring in the south-western Europe and the north-western Africa. In Europe the centre of the distribution is in the Iberian Peninsula, where the species is relatively common. The natural range extends towards the north to France. Its occurrence is always linked to the occurrence of water bodies. It inhabits preferably the banks covered by herbaceous or forest vegetation.

The conservation status in both the Mediterranean and the Atlantic biogeographical regions, is 'unknown'; the information about the status of this species is not available or is scarce. However the habitat of the species is across entire range threatened by direct human impact like draining, water pollution or destruction of the habitats. The Spanish terrapin is considered

'vulnerable' in Spain and 'endangered' in France.
