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

La Gomera Gecko is endemic to the island of La Gomera, Canary Islands, Spain. It can be found in variety of natural or cultural habitats like rock wall, rocky slopes covered by shrub vegetation, orchards or human settlements.

It occurs only in the Macaronesian biogeographical region. The conservations status of this within its range relatively common and abundant species is 'favourable', the range and the population size are stable and no major threats were recorded. The species is assessed as 'least concern' in the 2008 IUCN Red List.
