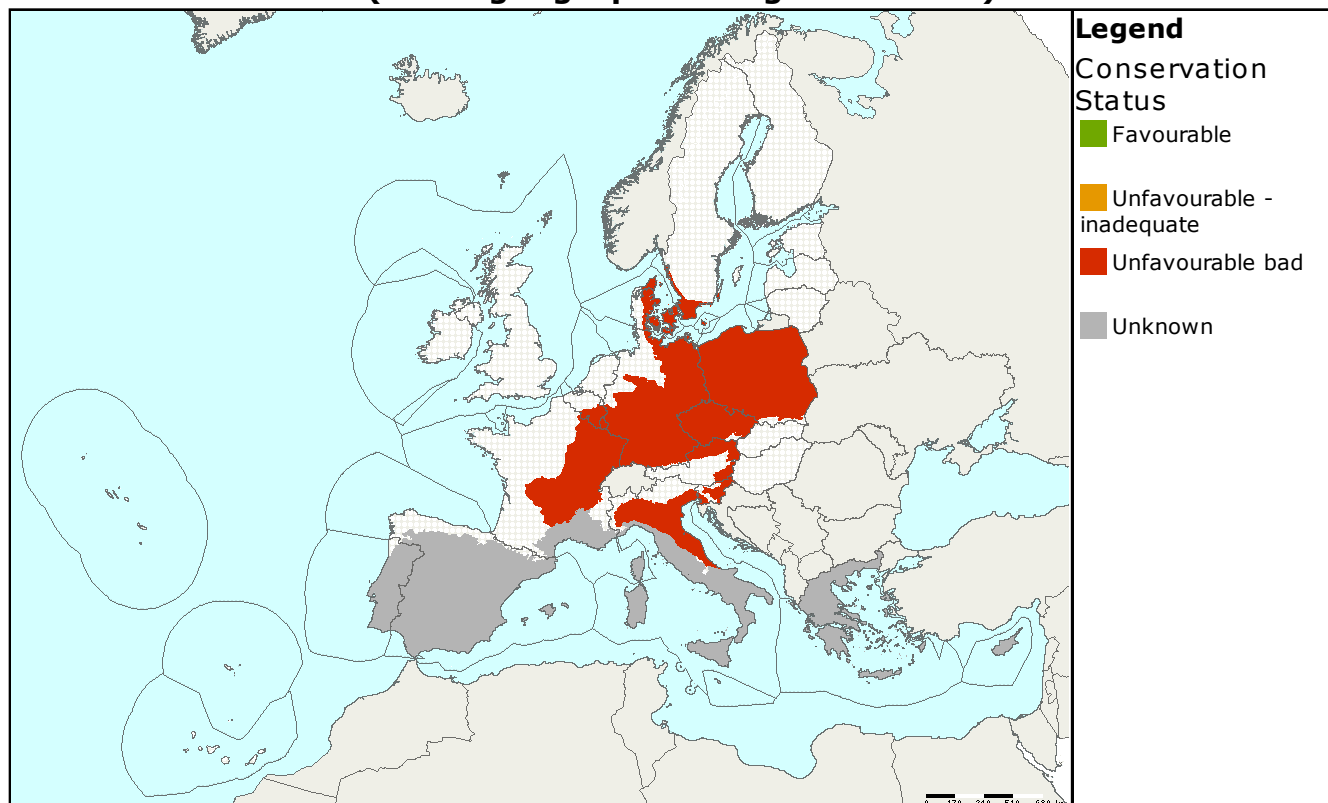

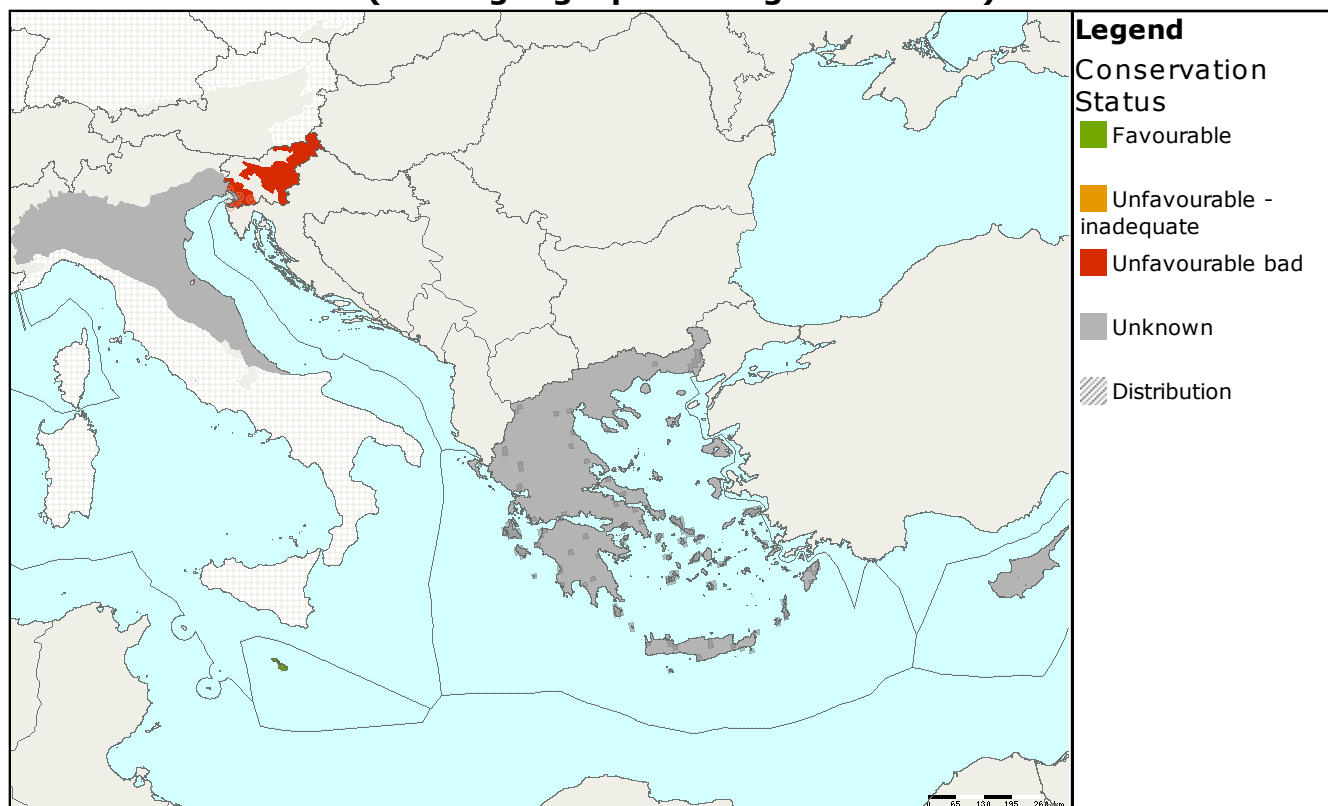

The natural range of the cat snake spreads from the southern Europe across the Middle East to the southern Russia. In the southern and the south-eastern Europe it inhabits various types of rocky habitats, mostly warm, dry and exposed to the sunlight.

The conservation status in the Alpine biogeographical region is 'unfavourable bad', which is largely due to the Future prospect of the species in Slovenia, where it reaches the north-western margin of its natural range. In the Mediterranean biogeographical region the status is 'unknown'. In general, the information about the status and trends of this obscure species is not available or is scarce.
