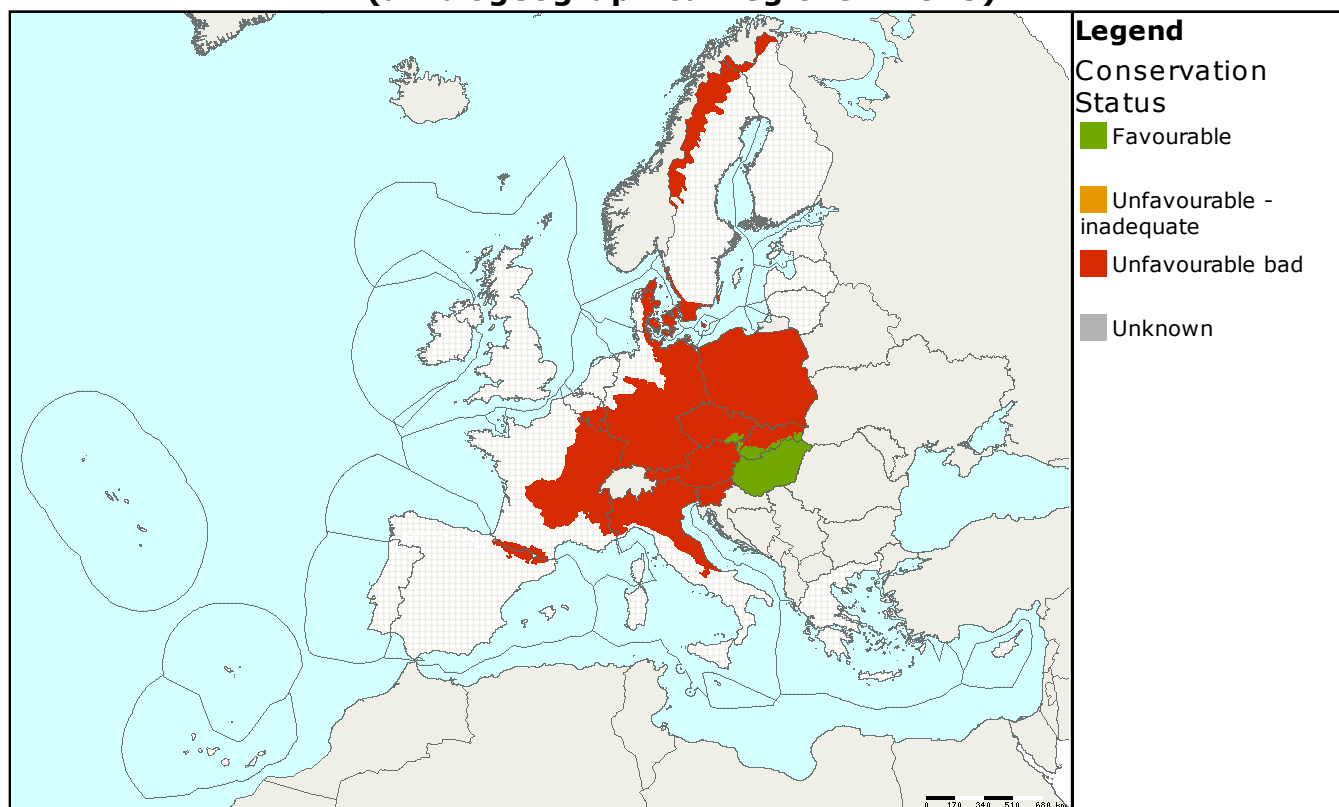

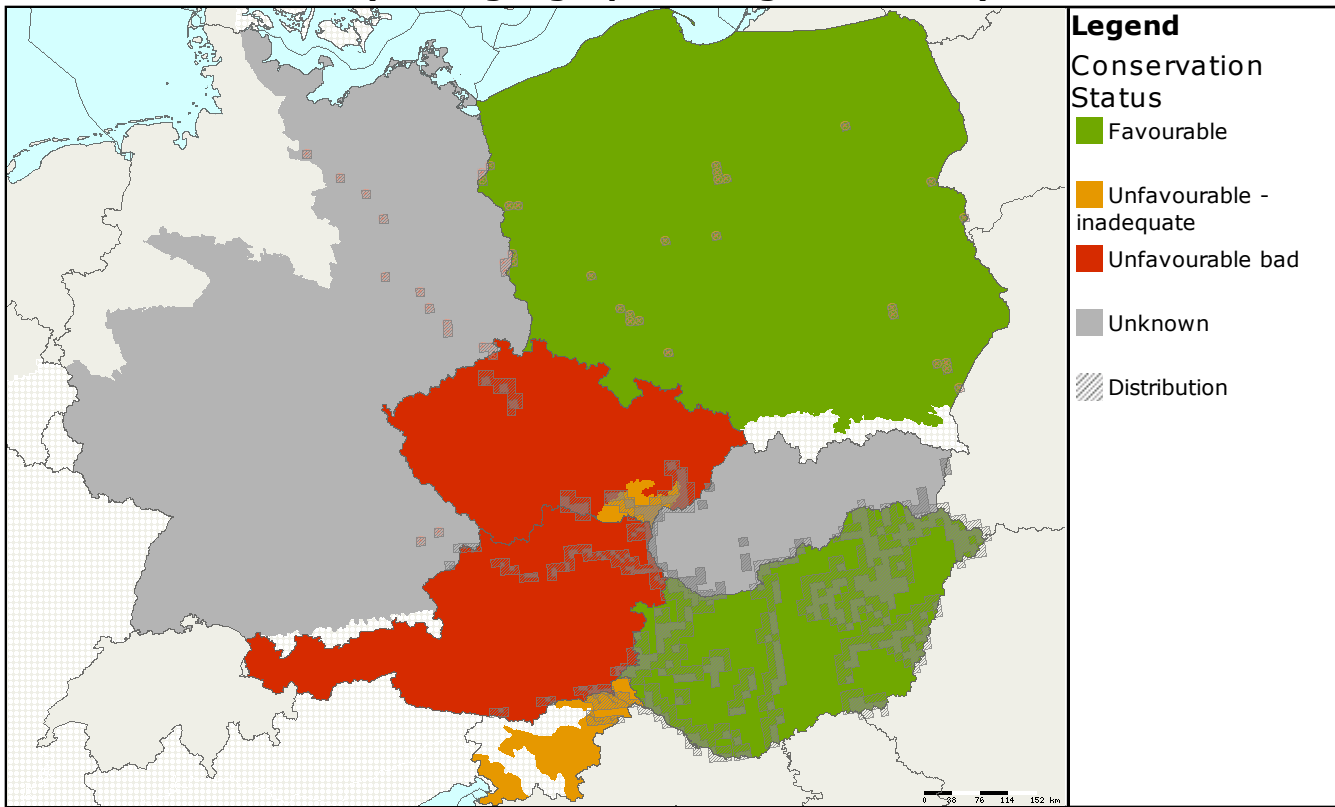

The white-finned gudgeon (current valid scientific name is *Romanogobio albipinnatus* (Lukasch, 1933)) is a fish which is widely spread across Central and particularly Eastern Europe. It has a preference for sandy bottoms of moderately flowing lowland rivers.

In the Alpine and Continental region this species' status was assessed as unfavourable 'bad', which is largely caused by the Austrian data report. However, within the Continental region the largest part of this species range is located in Poland, for which the status of this species was assessed as 'favourable'. Due to the Hungarian 'favourable' status, the overall status for the Pannonian region is 'favourable' as well. Some data from Germany and Slovakia are lacking. This species is locally threatened by pollution and water management, but is so widely spread that its IUCN conservation status is 'Least Concern'.
