


The wolverine is a species with circum-boreal natural range spreading from Feno-Scandinavia, over Siberia to Northern America. In Western Europe it now occurs in Norway, Sweden and Finland. Wolverines inhabit various types of habitats, like forests, bogs or open habitats

The conservation status in the Alpine biogeographical region, where the bigger part of the population occurs in Sweden is 'unknown', as the assessment was not provided by this country. In the Boreal biogeographical region, the conservation status is 'unfavourable inadequate' which reflects the status of the bigger Finnish population. In Finland the Population and the Future prospects have been assessed as 'unfavourable inadequate' because the local population has limited size and is fragmented.

In both countries the species is included in the national red lists under the category 'endangered' and in the European Mammal Assessment it is evaluated as 'vulnerable'.

The wolverine, like other large carnivores, comes often into the conflict with other types of land use.
